My mother-in -law, Bette Keller turned 97 years old this year. If you live or work in Lebanon, you may have seen her. She rides a threewheeled trike all around town with a handmade

license plate that reads "HARDLY-DAVIDSON". She has ridden that trike every year in the Lebanon 4th of July parade – the whole route, in 90-degree weather, rain or shine. She still lives at home with her youngest son, my brother-in-law Kerry. Kerry suffered a stroke two years ago that left him with a speech disability and made him very difficult to get along with. As long as I have known her, Bette has always been fiercely independent, very active and so interested in life.

But all that seemed to change last year. After the strain of taking care of Kerry and an illness of her own, she was rapidly declining. She was not able to do many of the things she used to do for herself. She didn't seem to have an interest in anything. She didn't even have the strength to ride her trike. My husband and I both work fulltime and live about 45 minutes away, so we felt like we couldn't give her as much help as she needed anymore.

That's when I reached out to BCSSI. Cindy Hickson came and met with all four of us. She sat down and she really listened – and she came up with a plan. All I can say is, sometimes the right people just come into your life at the right time. In this case, it was not only Cindy, it was Maria. Maria did more than just come in and help with housework and bathing. She brought Bette back to being Bette. Maria brought laughter, and caring, and dignity, and hope. She even managed to win over my difficult brother-in-law, and that is saying a lot. Maria comes to visit Bette and Kerry every Thursday - the day Bette now calls "Purrsday" because it makes her so happy. And I am happy to say Bette is back in the "trike saddle" again. She is full of life again and she is already planning how to decorate her trike for this year's 4th of July parade.

None of this would have happened without BCSSI. Thank you so much Cindy and Maria and all the wonderful people who make up such a great organization.
