

I'm not embarrassed to tell you that I love disco music. I even have my own disco ball!




My happy place is Rocky Fork Lake in Brazil, IN. Life is

# Hi, I'm Jessica and I'm a Caregiver...



I have been getting some excellent training on how to become a caregiver since accepting the Director of Outreach promotion eight years ago. Part of my job is

to take care of those who care for their loved ones by providing educational programming/workshops, special caregiver events, caregiver support group, developing The Caregiver Navigator and putting together this newsletter, The Caregiver's Corner.

When I accepted this new role, I really couldn't identify as a caregiver because I wasn't in the daily trenches like the caregivers I was working with. I just thought I was simply "helping out" my family members here and there with getting to & from appointments, picking up the occasional prescription or groceries, chores around the house. Well, I soon learned that if you are "helping out" an aging or chronically ill loved one you are classified as a family caregiver. The sooner you identify yourself as a caregiver the better. The better you can equip yourself with the skills, training, resources and support that are necessary before entering the frontline of daily caregiving.

January of this year my husband and I found ourselves right there in the frontline trenches with my fellow caregivers. Karen, my mother-in-law's, cancer had returned after being cancer free for almost a year. The cancer came back with a vengeance and treatment was not an option this time. On top of that she had been diagnosed with dementia last fall.

As a family we had to come up with a plan quickly! We decided we would share in the care of Karen. 14 She would spend half the week at our house & half the week at my bother-in-law's house, for as long as she was capable. Our first half week of caring went ok but it wasn't great for any of us, that's for sure. You would think with my skill set that I would get it semi-right but that wasn't the case. All I could say to Karen on the ride to my bother-in-law's house was I'm sorry that didn't go so well...we'll do better next week. And that's just what we did! I dug deep into my bag of caregiving tips, and we got better with each new week.

It wasn't long after we established a good working routine in the home that Karen asked if I would take her shopping. It was getting close to my husband's birthday and she wanted to buy him something. My thought was oh dear how does this caregiving thing work in the wild and can I handle this??!! I'm not much for retail therapy but my mother-in-law could spend hours in a store. So off we went to our local Wal Mart with our in case of an emergency bag. On the way to the store I asked her to think about what she wanted to buy Jeff for his birthday. Without any hesitation she said, fishing line, a case of beer and a good bottle of bourbon. All excellent gift choices for my husband. At this stage in her illness she had very little energy and nausea was a BIG problem. So we made a game plan to shop for Jeff's gifts first and then she could look/ shop for things that interested her.

I dropped her off at the door because we forgot to get her handicap parking permit at my brother-inlaw's. I made sure she got in the store safely before I parked the car. When I got in the store, I found her wedged between 2 electric scooters. Both of them were dead of course but we somehow managed to move them enough to get her unstuck. At this point I'm wishing we should have stayed home!

This was her first time navigating the store on a scooter and my first time assisting someone

while they shopped. In the past we would set a time to meet at the register and we would go our separate ways. Our first stop was the hunting/ fishing section. Karen beat me there, turns out she's a speed demon on a scooter. There was no way I could keep up. She was asking a gentleman where she could find fishing line, he did not work there, he was just waiting on a clerk to help get a fishing license. He kindly showed her where to find it and even gave her his recommendation on the best one to buy. I apologized and thanked him for his help. It turns out he was a caregiver for his mother and was happy to help. As we exit the aisle my mother-in -law takes out a section of foam coolers with the scooter. A lady nearby helped me put them back on the shelf. She shared that this was nothing... her mother had knocked over a huge store display on one of their shopping trips.

With the coolers back in place we were heading for the alcohol section and hoping we didn't take out any more merchandise along the way. We almost had it made, the beer & bourbon were in sight when Karen crashed the scooter into a shopping cart of a woman who was about my mother-law's age. AGAIN we were apologizing and stating we were new to this situation. The lady laughed it off, and said it brought back memories of her mother who she described as Mister Magoo on a scooter. She also assured us we would get the hang of it and we would look back on this day and have a good laugh.

Now that the gifts were in the cart, it was decided we needed ice cream. While trying to figure out which flavor we needed (because unlike Baskin Robbin's Wal Mart has more than 31 flavors) the nausea kicked in and wouldn't you know it I forgot to put the pills for that in our emergency bag! The only thing that bag was good for was in case we needed a barf bag!! I remembered the candy aisle was the next one over and I left Karen to grab a bag of peppermints to help settle her stomach. When I got back to her, I realized 15 between my cart and the scooter we were blocking half the ice cream cases. I apologized to the couple waiting for us to move. They said no worries they would circle back around later. They circled back around and guess what we were still there! Once again, I found out they too had been caregivers to both of their parents. They offered words of comfort to my mother-in-law and stayed with us until the peppermints took effect.

Karen was able to get in a little more retail therapy in and we checked out with any troubles, but we forgot the ice cream!!!

I left the store feeling grateful for all the camouflaged caregivers we met in the wild that day. You are pretty easy to see when you are out with your loved one. You helped make an imperfect day pretty perfect.

Caregivers I want you to know I see you more clearly these days....

I see how hard it is in the trenches. I see how tired you are. I see it's ridiculously hard to practice self-care. I see it all now and I have even more respect, and appreciation for what you go through daily.

Thank you to all the caregivers that I have had the privilege of working with. You have shaped me into the caregiver that I am today!

A few days after our adventures in Walmart Karen took a turn for the worst and passed away peacefully a week later. By the way she knew her son well....he loved his birthday gifts!!!

# Banana Pudding Recipe Submitted By: Sharon Walker

3 1/2 Tbsp. flour
1 1/3 c. sugar
Dash of salt
3 eggs, separated
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1-12oz pack vanilla wafers

6 medium bananas For Meringue: Eggs whites from above 1/4 c. + 2 Tbsp. sugar 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Combine flour, sugar and salt in a heavy saucepan. Beat egg yolks. Combine egg yolks and milk, mixing well. Stir into dry ingredients; cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Layer one-third of wafers in a 3-quart baking dish. Slice 2 bananas and layer over wafers. Pour one-third of custard over bananas. Repeat layers twice. To make the meringue: Beat room temperature eggs whites until foamy. Gradually add 1/4 c. + 2 Tbsp. sugar, 1 Tbsp. at a time, beating until stiff peaks form. Add vanilla and beat until blended. Spread meringue over custard, sealing to edge of dish. Bake at 425 for 10-12 mins., or until golden brown. \*Can be topped with cool whip rather then meringue. \* Recipe can be doubled.
